A Brief History of Chinese Knotting

The use of knots in Chinese culture dates back over one hundred thousand years ago. In those prehistoric times, events were recorded by tying knots. The Chinese used large knots to chronicle large events and smaller knots to record less important events. As the events became more complex, knots were replaced with pictures and eventually a written language.

In the early 5th century, we begin to see more evidence of knots being as much more than a means of tying two cords together. The various knot motifs found on pottery indicate that the knots were being used in a more decorative fashion. The Tang Dynasty (618-907) represented a time in Chinese History where high fashion and beauty were held in the highest regard. Evidence of knotting has been found in paintings, sculptures, tapestries, and even referenced in poetry. In the Yuan Dynasty (1276 - 1368), we begin to see knots used less often for functional purposes and more often as decoration. *(See image at the right.)*

Although very little evidence of the early knots remain, one of the most common materials used in early China was silk. Silk is a very strong and durable material, however, it does rot over time. Due to the delicate nature of the silk, there are very few remaining specimens of traditional Chinese knotting still in existence prior to the Ching Dynasty (1644-1900). Silk, cotton, and linen cording is still used today to make knots.

The art of knotting also played an important role in early Chinese Society. Chinese knotting was considered a necessary skill for all unmarried women to master. The techniques of knotting were passed down orally from grandmother to mother to daughter. This oral tradition also accounts for the difficulty historians have faced when researching the early knotting techniques. Since knotting was considered a folk art, written instructions were not considered necessary, so there are no written records to track the evolution of Chinese knotting. As historians, we must rely heavily on the artifacts left behind by the early Chinese to rediscover this fine art.

Each Knot has a specific pattern that must be followed in order to achieve the same knot design on both the front and back of the knot. There is an element of Zen required to successfully master Chinese knotting. If you are patient and willing to take your time while working with these knots, this art form can be very rewarding.

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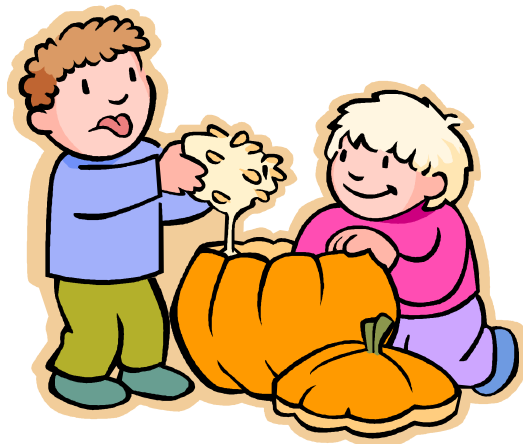


Pendant
